Now we want to move forward in an active and planful way, so branch leadership has designated 2021-22 a planning year to better prepare us to advance our mission and pursue our vision into the future. So, while continuing to maintain regular functions, our branch will devote this program year to planning for our future.

As is true of many beneficial efforts, these may be difficult, but to quote Einstein, *In the middle of every difficulty lies opportunity*.

As members of the Lake / Sumter branch of AAUW, we have real opportunities to direct our future. And because these are planning efforts, they will require only short-term commitments and small involvements but their impact on the future of our branch will be huge.

So, what kind of planning efforts are we talking about? Here are some examples:

## **Members Who Make Our Branch Work**

### **Tech Trek**

Tech Trek is an activity for girls the summer they complete seventh grade. The national, state, and local branches of AAUW support this endeavor which encourages girls to take an interest in STEM (science, technology, engineering, and math). A STEM camp is held each summer for one week on a college campus. Due to COVID, the girls participated in a virtual camp this past year.

Each fall the Tech Trek chair contacts middle schools in Lake and Sumter County and asks for their support in nominating girls. Each school can nominate up to five girls. A process occurs whereby the nominated girls complete applications for the state committee. In the spring the local branch's Tech Trek committee is asked to interview the local candidates and rank them for selection by the state. The girls chosen from each branch are then given a fully paid camping experience compliments of the local branch.

The local branch funds these girls through grants, donations, and our general fund. In January the participants are invited to the local branch's general meeting to share their projects and insights into what camp meant to them.

#### **Laura McLaughlin**



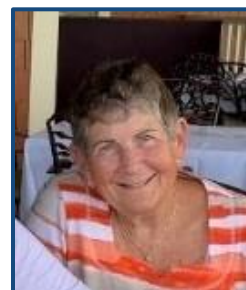
I was born and raised in Charleston, West Virginia, where I attended public schools. Following graduation from Charleston High School I went on to complete a degree from Mary Baldwin College (now University) located in Staunton, Virginia in 1969. The Vietnam war was at its peak at that time, and I was selected by the American Red Cross to join a program titled Supplemental Recreation Activities Overseas. All of us young women were commonly known as Donut Dollies. I spent 13 months in country returning home after a life changing year.

It took me several years to find my passion in life. After years of various sales jobs, I discovered real estate, became a realtor, and as an important adjunct a property investor. Much of my effort was spent renovating residential homes in the historic district in Jacksonville, FL, where I lived for 35 years.

I moved to The Villages in 2016 and joined AAUW in 2019. Due to the pandemic, I have not had an opportunity to meet many members. Regardless, I am enthusiastic about co-chairing the Tech Trek Committee as I see that this endeavor potentially can change the direction of young girls' lives here locally.

### **Liz Schweers**

I'm the little old lady from Pasadena, CA, my birthplace. Most of my formative years were spent in Santa Barbara, CA, where I also completed my first two years of college at the University of California, Santa Barbara. Eventually I earned a Bachelor of Arts in Business Teacher Education from the University of Nebraska, Lincoln. This degree was almost a guarantee that I would be unemployed in my field. That and raising four children as well as moving 26 times (starting in CA, then HI, AK, NM, WA state, IN, IL, Germany, and finally landing in FL).



My typing/shorthand skills allowed me to work my way through most of my college days where I was employed as secretary to three deans. Upon graduation with my bachelor's degree, I went on hiatus for 13 years raising a family. During those years I served as LWV State secretary and was nominated to be State president, BUT WE MOVED.

I did have a few teaching assignments—overseas with DODS as a middle school English teacher and Reading Specialist, working for the German government teaching English to British kids attending German schools, and stateside teaching business subjects to adults in a Florida business college. I was an administrator at two military bases for private colleges offering a graduate degree to military personnel. My last employment was as a contractor for the State of Florida at a high school where I worked with low-income students on a work/study program.

I have resided in The Villages for nine years and been a part of AAUW since 2010 where I have worn the hats of Hospitality, co-President, Membership, and now co-Chair Tech

Trek. Pre-COVID-19 I was an active tutor with Tutors 4 Kids and taught English as a Second Language.

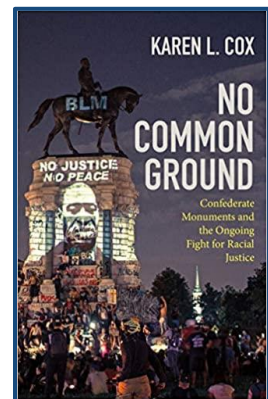

## Great Read from the Diversity Committee

This month's Great Read is *No Common Ground: Confederate Monuments and the Ongoing Fight for Racial Justice* by Karen L. Cox. The following information is drawn from the book's publisher, The University of North Carolina Press.

*When it comes to Confederate monuments, there is no common ground. Polarizing debates over their meaning have intensified into legislative maneuvering to preserve the statues, legal battles to remove them, and rowdy crowds taking matters into their own hands. These conflicts have raged for well over a century--but they've never been as intense as they are today.*

*In this eye-opening narrative of the efforts to raise, preserve, protest, and remove Confederate monuments, Karen L. Cox depicts what these statues meant to those who erected them and how a movement arose to force a reckoning. She lucidly shows the forces that drove white southerners to construct beacons of white supremacy, as well as the ways that anti monument sentiment, largely stifled during the Jim Crow era, returned with the civil rights movement, and gathered momentum in the decades after the Voting Rights Act of 1965. Monument defenders responded with gerrymandering and "heritage" laws intended to block efforts to remove these statues, but hard as they worked to preserve the Lost Cause vision of southern history, civil rights activists, Black elected officials, and movements of ordinary people fought harder to take the*





*story back. Timely, accessible, and essential, No Common Ground is the story of the seemingly invincible stone sentinels that are just beginning to fall from their pedestals.*

Written by an historian, this book provides a broader view of the events Mitch Landrieu addressed in his book, *In the Shadow of Statues*. In today's terms, it offers positions on "both sides;" as such it represents a rich two-sided historical treatment of what has been presented traditionally as a one-sided narrative.

Happy Birthday, Dorothy!

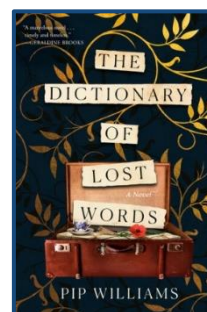
