DEI Great Reads

For this summer, we feature the 2025 winners of the Anisfield-Wolf Book Awards. "For 90 years, the Anisfield-Wolf Book Awards have championed fearless, groundbreaking literature that challenges the status quo, ignites dialogue, and shapes a more just and inclusive world," said Lillian Kuri, president and CEO of the Cleveland Foundation, which presents the award.

Anisfield-Wolf Book Awards VEARS * Presented by the Cleveland Foundation

The Anisfield-Wolf Book Awards jury, chaired by Pulitzer Prize-winning poet Natasha Trethewey, selected this year's distinguished group of winners:



- Fiction: Colored Television by Danzy Senna Jane Gibson has high hopes that her life is about to turn around as she meets with a Hollywood producer to develop her second novel into a comedy show for a streaming network— but things don't work out quite as planned.
- Nonfiction: The United States Governed By Six Hundred Thousand Despots: A True Story of Slavery by John Swanson Jacobs, edited by Jonathan Schroeder – Rediscovered after having been published in an Australian newspaper in 1855, this first-person slave narrative tells the life story of John Swanson Jacobs, who fled both the South and the United States altogether, becoming a stateless citizen of the world and its waters. The second half of the book contains a full-length, nine-generation biography of Jacobs and his family by literary historian Schroeder.
- Memoir: Feeding Ghosts by Tessa Hulls In her deeply moving graphic memoir debut, Hulls traces the reverberations of Chinese history across three generations of women in her family, exposing the fear and trauma that haunt them and the love that holds them together.
- Poetry: Yard Show by Janice N. Harrington As seen through the documentation of objects found within yard shows, this collection of descriptive, lyrical, and experimental poems speaks to how Black Americans have shaped a sense of belonging and place in the Midwest.

Lifetime Achievement: Yusef Komunyakaa – A professor of creative writing at New York University, known for his lyrical explorations of the Vietnam War, rural Southern life, and race, this Pulitzer Prize-winning poet has shaped contemporary poetry with a voice that is both unflinching and deeply evocative.

Members Visit Clydesdale Farm

On Thursday, April 10, 17 AAUW members and two friends met at the Colony Cottage Recreation Center and drove to Dunnellon, Florida to visit the Grandview Clydesdale Farm and Tours, one of the most awardwinning Clydesdale farms in the world. The ladies participated in a two-hour guided tour of the Grandview Clydesdales operation which gave them an opportunity to learn about this famous breed of horse.




Over the course of the afternoon, they learned about the day-to-day operations of the farm from the ultrasounding of the mares for breeding to the birth of baby Clydesdales.

In addition, they viewed the life of a Clydesdale from babyhood through adulthood to winning national and international championships and even starring in Budweiser commercials. The presentations were given in air-conditioned buildings where there was seating for everyone. The visit to see a mom and baby Clydesdales was in an open viewing area that was also under cover.

After visiting the farm, the group traveled to the nearby Stumpknockers Restaurant on the Withlacoochee River to enjoy a seafood dinner in a charming old Florida setting. There the food was good, and the company was even better. The day ended back at Colony Cottage where we said our goodbyes and headed for home with lots of memories of our day on the farm.

Tech Trek

Fourteen girls applied to attend the 2025 Tech Trek Summer Camps. All the girls were interviewed by our branch Tech Trek Committee. Based on the committee's feedback, Florida AAUW accepted all 14 girls but only 13 decided to attend the camps. Donations from various individuals and organizations made it possible for AAUW Lake/Sumter to fund all the girls.

Five girls will participate in the summer camp held on the campus of Stetson University in Deland. The core courses at this camp are Qualcomm Thinkabit Lab, Marine Science, Forensic Science, and Environmental Science.

The remaining girls will be attending the camp held at Florida Atlantic University in Jupiter where the core classes are Qualcomm Wearable Tech, Structural Engineering, Neuroscience and Marine Biology.

Scholarships


