Diversity, Equity, & Inclusion (DEI)



Great Read From DEI



Struggling to Learn: An Intimate History of School Desegregation in South Carolina

by June M. Thomas (published March 31, 2022)

In 1964 14-year-old June Manning Thomas walked into Orangeburg High School as one of 13 Black students selected to integrate the all-White school. *Struggling to Learn* revisits her life growing up in the midst of the civil rights movement before, during, and after desegregation. Through poignant personal narrative and supported by meticulous research, Thomas traces the history of Black education in South Carolina from the post-Civil War era to the present. (Despite the landmark 1954 *Brown v. Board of Education* decision that declared school segregation illegal, South Carolina officials did not integrate any public schools until 1963, and the majority of them refused to admit Black students until the intervention of the federal government forced all schools to start desegregating in the fall of 1970.)

Now a Professor Emerita of Urban Planning at the University of Michigan, Thomas reveals how local leaders, educators, parents, and the NAACP joined forces to improve the quality of education for Black students in K-12 schools and higher education and why Black people persisted despite opposition and hostility from White citizens. In the final chapters, she explores the current state of education for Black children and young adults in South Carolina and assesses what has been achieved and learned through this collective struggle.

This book is part memoir, part well-researched history...from reconstruction to the present time...of efforts to provide quality education to Black students in South Carolina. I found it well-written and engaging as well as interesting, informative, and chilling.

Public Policy



To guarantee equality, individual rights, and social justice for a diverse and inclusive society, AAUW advocates the passage and ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment.

The Equal Rights Amendment (ERA) is a proposed amendment to the United States Constitution designed to guarantee equal legal rights for all American citizens regardless of sex. It states:

"Section 1. Equality of rights under the law shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of sex.

"Section 2. The Congress shall have the power to enforce, by appropriate legislation, the provisions of this article.

"Section 3. This amendment shall take effect two years after the date of ratification."

The majority of Americans mistakenly believe that women and men have equal rights *under the Constitution*.

The first version of ERA was written in the 1920s by Alice Paul, a suffragist. Kate Kelly, an attorney and ERA advocate states, "We will not have permanent protections if we are not in the Constitution."

The time for constitutional protections for gender has never been more urgent. The lack of constitutional equality reaches every aspect of women's lives. The ERA will clarify, once and for all, that sex discrimination in employment and wages, reproductive rights, insurance, Social Security, education, and more is a violation of constitutional rights. The Constitutional Amendment will outlast every person on the Supreme Court.

Women in the United States have waited long enough for the ERA to be fully ratified. We cannot wait for equality any longer! Send a message to your Senators urging their support for the ratification of the EQUAL RIGHTS AMENDMENT!

SUPPORT

Straight Talk About Fund Raising

In our branch, we talk about fundraising in the hushed tones folks use when they're talking about distasteful topics. We just don't like raising money. But the facts suggest that our branch is in dire straits and will be challenged to meet our obligations this year if we don't plan and carry out some events to raise funds.

We can thank the COVID-19 pandemic to a certain extent: We haven't run major fundraisers in the past two years. Our branch leaders also haven't been able to identify a member willing to serve as Fundraising Director this year, and there are no plans on the table for raising money to operate our branch and support the young women and girls in their STEM education endeavors. As a result, our coffers are perilously close to empty.

A Call to Action

We are turning to you, our members, for help. You may ask, "But what can I do?" Glad you asked.

- A member (or two) could step up to coordinate fundraising efforts. The expectation is NOT for these volunteers to design and implement major fundraisers; the expectation IS that they will solicit ideas and plans from other members for small fundraising events during the year that those members will carry out. You can find the description of the Fundraising Director position in the Board Handbook, which is on the Members' Page of our website (www.lakesumteraauw.org).
- A group of members could come together to organize a small fundraiser. We have, for example, detailed plans for a "Farewell to the Old Card Mah Jongg Night," which could be implemented easily. We ran that back in 2019 and raised just under \$1,500...this year, that would cover one campership to Tech Trek or one college scholarship. Or members could develop their own plans and implement them. Plans could be submitted to the Board for approval and coordination, in the absence of a Fundraising Director.
- You may not see yourself in either of the above options but still resonate with our plight and would like to help. Money talks. If each of our 118 members donated \$50, the total of \$5,900 would send five girls to Tech Trek. So, send checks, made out to
